
OER Definition

Open Educational Resources (OER) are teaching, learning, and research materials that are either (a) in the public domain, or (b) licensed in a manner that provides everyone with free and perpetual permission to engage in the 5R activities associated with OER [retain, reuse, revise, remix, redistribute]

Assessing the Impact of Two OER Pilots

Survey data were collected:

- ▶ To better understand student perspectives

Survey Groups

- Courses that required the purchase of textbooks
- Courses that offered OER for free

What did we learn?

- > 42% had delayed access or never gained access to reading materials.
- > Students hold negative attitudes about purchasing textbooks.
 - They reported feeling "anxious," "stressed," and "overwhelmed."
 - They cannot afford to purchase texts, so they often choose not to.
 - They believe it should be included in tuition or fees or provided for them.
- > Students view general education differently compared to their majors.
 - Spending money on major course texts makes sense to students.
- Engagement with reading materials and perceiving a connection between reading and performance were significantly higher for students using OER.
 - They read more often and more closely and perceived a greater benefit.

Where do we go from here?

- Encourage more faculty, staff, and administrators to earn Creative Commons certification

- Spread the word about the OER course attribute in Banner to advisors, students, and parents
- Encourage student input into creating OER as a high impact practice
