



## Tenure

What is academic tenure?

A tenured faculty member holds an appointment that can be terminated only for cause or under extraordinary circumstances, such as financial emergency or program discontinuation. It does <u>not</u> mean a job for life.

## Tenure

#### Why is tenure important?

- ♦ To safeguard academic freedom, which is necessary for all who teach and conduct research in higher education
- ♦ To foster free inquiry, free expression, and open discussion by students and faculty
- ♦ To attract and retain high-quality faculty members






#### Overall High School Graduate Trends




- 3,409,100 high school graduates, on average, projected per year between school years 2011-12 and 2031-32.





# Financial aid awards: 2015-16 (last completed year)

- ♦ Federal Pell Grant for low income students: 9,060 students received a total of \$36,161,325.
- ♦ 18,984 unduplicated students received some sort of federal, state, institutional, or external financial aid administered by the Financial Aid Office, with an average award per student of \$10,513.
- ♦ MTSU Financial Aid **processed a total of \$199,581,443** in all forms of aid during the 2015-16 award year.
  - ♦ Nearly \$137M in federal funds
  - ♦ Nearly \$35M in state funds
  - ♦ Nearly \$18M in institutional aid
  - ♦ Nearly \$2M in Foundation Scholarships
  - Approximately \$9M in external loans and scholarships











MTSU Highest in the State




## 2015-16 Low-Income Population\* Bachelor's Degrees Granted

#### Funding Formula Summary

- ♦ MTSU excels in the awarding of Bachelor's degrees and is committed to the primary goal of the Drive to 55
- Tunding is highly dependent on how other institutions perform on the metrics

- ♦ MTSU was already a high performer smaller growth area
- ♦ Low performers have room to "move the needle"

  - Suilding Conditions and Infrastructure / ITD
  - ♦ Athletics

  - \* Campus Open Space (Parking and Transportation, Grounds, Security, Operations, Wayfinding, Bikes/Pedestrian Access, and Signage).

#### Campus Master Plan Timeline

  - ♦ December 2015 April 2016: Documentation and Recommendations
  - ♦ April August 2016: Master Plan Approvals to TBR, THEC, and SBC
