According to the U.S. Census Bureau, "the population age 65 and over increased from 37.8 million in 2007 to 50.9 million in 2017 (a 34% increase) and is projected to reach 94.7 million in 2060" (Administration for Community Living, April 2018, p. 1). 
THEMES DERIVED FROM REVIEW
