Description

The Master of Music in Music Education degree is

designed for music educators who are currently teaching in K-12 music settings and is intended to provide them with tools and perspectives to pursue positions of leadership in the field of music education, specifically in the areas of pedagogy, research, and advocacy. All courses are delivered entirely in a distance learning environment. Courses encourage students to use their current teaching contexts to generate perspectives on philosophy and pedagogy while learning to apply new resources and frameworks. Graduates gain experiences with consuming and conducting research appropriate for pursuit of terminal degrees. Further, they develop an awareness of issues and tools regarding music and education and are equipped to lead in responding to professional challenges.

Program Structure

A set of core courses provides students with comprehensive insights into the basic expectations, problems and methods of research in music education. Additional coursework addresses the issues of the modern classroom.

She serves as chair of the American Choral Directors Association Education and Communication National Standing Committee and serves on the Advisory Committee for the National Association for Music Education Music Educators Journal.

Jennifer Vannatta-Hall Ed.D. is the Interim Director for the School of Music and teaches undergraduate and graduate courses in music education. She has presented workshops and conference sessions all over the United States and was a visiting professor of music at Hangzhou Normal University in China (2019). She frequently conducts and adjudicates choral festivals. Her research interests include early childhood music teacher education and K-12 general music. Her book, *Music Teaching Self-Efficacy in Early Childhood Teacher Education*, was published in 2013.

Facilities

MTSU is an "All-Steinway School" with a thriving School of Music and excellent facilities, including the James E. Walker Library (a four story, 250,000-square-foot building with over 1 million volumes and more than 33,000 periodicals). Music Education students have access to the library's extensive online collection

Admission Requirements

Admission to the program requires an earned bachelor's degree in music from an accredited university or college and a 3.0 grade point average in all college work. Applicants must also be currently employed as a K-12 music teacher.

To apply, a student should submit:

- an application with the appropriate application fee (online at www.mtsu.edu/graduate/ apply.php)
- official transcripts of all previous college work
- three letters of recommendation
- a 30-minute teaching demonstration video

Deadlines

Students are admitted on a rolling basis.
